Survey Of Los Angeles High School Students, Parents, And Voters

March 2024



Research Approach

- A first-of-its-kind public opinion survey in L.A. County of voters, parents, and high school students to understand perceptions and attitudes towards skilled trades education and future career paths.
- Intentional community-centered approach to capture voices often not included.



Methodology

Four Focus Groups:

August 28-September 8, 2023

- South L.A. Black/African American Parents
- L.A. Harbor Latino High School Students
- L.A. Harbor Latino Parents (in Spanish)
- South L.A. Black/African American High School Students

Three Online Surveys:

November 20, 2023-January 21, 2024

- 400 L.A. County Registered Voters
- 495 Parents of Students attending L.A.
 County Public High Schools
- 258 Students attending L.A.
 County Public High Schools




KEY FINDING #1

Voters, parents and high school students overwhelmingly support the expansion and increased funding of skilled trades education in Los Angeles County high schools.

Majority Support for Expansion of Skilled Trades Exists Among Poll Respondents




Strong Support Also Exists for Expansion of Funding for Skilled Trades Education










Voters Who Agree it "Was a Mistake" to Remove Skilled Trades Programs from Local High Schools.

Q: How would you rate the job public high schools in the Los Angeles region are doing in the following areas?








Nearly 7 in 10 L.A. County public high school students surveyed said they would consider taking a skilled trades class if it were offered.






Poll Respondents

and Pay Well






Many Poll

Gender




